Rector's Reflection

Pentecost: **Come Holy Spirit!**

In the Christian liturgical year, Pentecost became a feast commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Disciples and other followers of Jesus Christ, as described in the Acts of the Apostles 2:1–31. (Some say there were 120 women and men, who were followers of Christ present that day). For this reason, some Christians today, refer to Pentecost as the "Birthday of the Church." Pentecost is celebrated seven weeks (50 days) after Easter Sunday, hence its name. Pentecost falls on the tenth day after Ascension Thursday. Ascension Day is May 5th this year.

The remarkable story of that day, told in Acts, describes how the disciples suddenly spoke many languages and were empowered by the Holy Spirit. The community of believers was on its way as a worldwide, international faith.

We trust that the Holy Spirit supports and assists us in our Christian walk. The fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. (*Galatians 5: 22-23*)

This year we will celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit with an international flair in our worship service. The scriptures will be read by members in English and other languages. Our music will celebrate the wonder and power of the Holy Spirit in our Church and in our lives.

The symbols of the Holy Spirit are:

- The Dove (Jesus' baptism) - look at the Dove window in the Nave
- Wind (Creation/Pentecost) – "rushing wind"
- Flames and Fire (Pentecost) - "tongues as of fire," symbolized by the color red

Wear Red on **Pentecost, Sunday May 15th** and **Come Celebrate the Spirit!**

Dear friends,

We would like to express our deep gratitude for the messages of affection and prayers we have received for our Diocese and our country during this very difficult time.

We have lived an unforgettable experience in which we feared for our lives, the lives of our loved ones, and the lives of the members of our faith community. We have clung with deep fervor to the protective hand of our God.

While seeing images in the newspapers and social networks, I just think about the suffering of our compatriots.

I pray for comfort and solidarity for all those who have lost loved ones, that God would also encourage them and restore them in His infinite mercy and goodness.

The coastal area of our country suffered considerable damage to its infrastructure, loss of life, and a large number of people are injured and missing. One of the most affected areas by the earthquake are the cities of Manta and Portoviejo and the town of La Pila, where our church has a presence. We are getting reports that 48 church members' homes are completely or partially destroyed and three churches have considerable damage in their physical structure. Fortunately, there was no loss of life among our members, but there are some with bruises and physical and psychological trauma.

The community is already engaged because there are basic needs of drinking water, food, medicine, first-aid kits, and basic tools. In

general, all the elements needed for rescue efforts.

There are many victims that require our attention. We will seek ways to send help although the roads have been affected. With the help of the National Police or other government agency we will find a way to reach those who need it the most. We appreciate your prayers and support,

### **Building Bridges: Connecting Police, Church and Community**

A Message on Building Bridges from the Bishop The Rt. Rev. Eugene Taylor Sutton, Bishop of Maryland  
*April 14, 2016*

Dear friends in Christ,

We are approaching the anniversary of the death of Freddie Gray in police custody and the violent uprising in response. Baltimore has seen the effects of what I have been calling the "unholy trinity" of racism, poverty and violence.

There are two upcoming events I call to your attention that will help us to remember and respond to those tragedies of last year.

The first is the Interfaith Prayer Service for Peace in Baltimore, April 25, 7:00 PM, at the Basilica of the Assumption, 409 Cathedral St., Baltimore. People of all faiths are welcome to join in prayer for healing the city following the events surrounding the death of Freddie Gray.

The second is a community forum at which I and Lt. Col. Melvin Russell of the Baltimore City Police Department are the featured speakers. We're calling it, "Building Bridges: Connecting Police, Church and Community." It will take place on Wednesday, May 4, 2016 from 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM at the Diocesan Center, 4 East University Parkway, Baltimore, MD 21218.

I'm grateful for the work and the witness of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland for putting together this forum. I welcome hearing many voices in this important discussion that is long overdue in so many of our cities.

Our challenge is to find ways forward that serve all the citizens of Baltimore and across the state. As followers of Christ we are committed to seeking economic, racial and civil justice for everyone.

If you are unable to join us, please pray for us on the evening of May 4. Together let us find ways to "do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our God" (*Micah 6:8*) in these troubled times.

## Good Friday Stations of the Cross

On Good Friday ~ the Passion of the Lord. Five Christian congregations of Western Howard County joined to walk the Stations of the Cross. This tradition is a special and memorable time for Christians. In St. Peter's Square Pope Francis said Christian unity was the work of the Holy Spirit,



which means Christians need to pray together in a "spiritual ecumenism, an ecumenism of prayer." He said some people may not realize they can pray with Christians of other denominations, adding that people must do so because "all of us have received the same baptism, all of us are following the path of Jesus, we want Jesus." All of the participants, were delighted to pray together in Christian community.

## Who is my neighbor? Carrie's and Dorothy's Good Friday Adventure:



There is a light rain. But that is okay. We have our rain gear and water bottles. We are all set. When we arrive at St. Bartholomew's, the air feels electrified as we greet friends and meet new people. There is great anticipation and anxiety. We are assured that a car would be available if one needed to ride when tired. We are loaded into cars. Off we go. During the twenty-five minute ride to the Church of the Resurrection, we wondered, what have we gotten ourselves into? Did the Canon to the Ordinary, The Rev. Dr. Scott Slater, mislead us? It seems as if we are travelling more than eight miles already, and we are not there yet. When we arrive at the church, we are welcomed by happy people, hospitality, and the opportunity to

be refreshed. We gather for prayer, instruction and sending forth. The excitement builds as we take our first steps in this journey, "The Walk across Baltimore." People take turns carrying the cross that leads us as we walk from East to West following Route 40. Fourteen times, along the way we stop to pray for individuals who died from any kind of violence. About an hour into the walk, Carrie is wilting badly and Dorothy is full steam ahead. We notice the sights and sounds of the City. The good, the bad, the beautiful, the ugly; sometimes all in the same space. Finally, we see the imposing St. Luke's, the half way mark of the journey and lunch. We are warmly welcomed by St. Luke's parishioners and others who will join in the second leg of the walk. Before we eat, there is the Stations of the Cross service. The Stations are located in various areas in the community surrounding the church. Outdoors. Stations. Good Friday. A tangle of emotions. Reflections. After lunch and being refreshed, the Westward journey continues. Carrie has opted to ride in the car. Again, pauses for prayer. We notice growth and decay, lush greenery and broken concrete sidewalks, storefronts and plazas. There are cherry blossoms on Carey Street in mid-town Baltimore. At last, the Rose window of St. Bart's and the end of the walk. Once more we are met with great hospitality (including chocolate) and joy. Here we have a brief service of commemoration and the tolling of the bell fourteen times (by tradition there are 14 Stations of the Cross). It has been a very long day and a rewarding experience that words cannot describe. To actually walk, imagining and reflecting on the last earthly hours of Jesus, is profoundly humbling and hard. Our experience was not about the walk or the landscape. We experienced a serious communion with neighbors and neighborhoods. Neighbors, who are strangers and neighborhoods that are unfamiliar places. On our way home in the early evening, Carrie is wondering if her feet are still attached to her body and somehow Dorothy is all smiles and peppy. Good thing Dorothy is driving.

## Building and Grounds

Please notice and use the new wooden steps at the back porch of the parish hall addition. They are more user friendly with a shorter rise for each step. Please thank Jeff Spaulding for completing this project.

On April 20, Martin Electric completed the installation of a new 60 amp supply cable from the old basement panel box to a brand new panel box with modern breakers in the Narthex of the church. This is a 20% upgrade and will provide needed supply for future lighting and other power needs. This is a significant first step to allow for appropriate lighting in the Nave and elsewhere. The cost of this first stage is \$950.

Last summer half of the Parish Life Center porch roof was sealed and re-shingled. This winter the other half began leaking and we will need to complete repairs on that ASAP. We are intending to do the work ourselves to save money but we will need many helpers. This will be scheduled sometime after the Yard Sale.




